POLITICAL - Governance & Legislation



PM Maliki Meets Separately with Ayatollah Sistani and Presidency Council Regarding SOFA:

- Iraqi Prime Minister Nuri al-Maliki traveled October 10 to Najaf and met with Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani – Iraq’s most influential Shi’a cleric – to discuss the Strategic Framework/Status of Forces Agreement. Maliki said Sistani “does not want anything forced or imposed on the Iraqi people” and that he will not reject the agreement if the government and Council of Representatives approve it. Ayatollah Sistani’s office had no comment on the meeting. On October 14, Prime Minister Maliki met with President Jalal Talabani and Vice Presidents Tariq al-Hashemi, and Adel Abdul-Mahdi to discuss what was referred to as the “final draft” of the agreement.

POLITICAL - Governance & Legislation



Government Responds to Violence as Christians Flee Mosul:

- Many Iraqi Christians have left Mosul following a recent spate of attacks. Prime Minister Maliki's office said on October 12 that the Prime Minister was ordering the Iraqi Army and police in the Mosul area "to provide protection for members of this community." The Government of Iraq sent over 1000 police to Mosul and announced that it would send a cabinet-level delegation to the city to investigate the situation. A government spokesman said in a statement that "the cabinet stressed the need to move quickly to support the security effort with intensive military operations to restore security and order in Mosul and to reassure citizens." Muqtada al-Sadr reportedly sent representatives to meet with Christian leaders in Baghdad to express solidarity. The Organization of the Islamic Conference also has condemned the attacks. Yonadim Kanna, a Christian member of Iraq's Council of Representatives, said that there is now a degree of stability in the city and that he expects Christian families that have fled to return.



POLITICAL – Key Legislation and Refugee Update

Legislative Process



Provincial Elections	PASSED: The CoR passed the law on September 24 and the Presidency Council signed the law on October 7. The law must be published in the Official Gazette to enter into force. The CoR is considering mechanisms to amend the law to include provisions for minorities.
Hydrocarbons Package	The level of control allocated to the central government in the July 2007 draft version of the Framework Law (currently in CoR Committee) is the key point of disagreement; there may be more progress on the Revenue Management Law, currently with the Shura Council, in the coming months.
Amnesty Law	PASSED: CoR approved the law on February 13; the law was signed by the Presidency Council February 26 and was implemented March 2.
Pensions Amendment	PASSED: Published in the Official Gazette December 2007.
De-Ba'athification Reform	PASSED: Approved by default by the Presidency Council February 2008. Published in the Official Gazette in mid-February.
Provincial Powers	PASSED: CoR approved the law on February 13; the law was vetoed by the Presidency Council February 26. The veto was rescinded on March 19, allowing the law to take effect.

Refugee Update

- Refugees in the region: 2-2.4 million
- Internally displaced persons in Iraq: 2.7 million
- The U.S. admitted 13,823 Iraqi refugees in FY08 (which ended October 1).
- The U.S. seeks to admit a minimum of 17,000 Iraqi refugees in FY09.



SECURITY - Situation Update

AQI's Second in Command Killed:

- Coalition Forces announced that Abu Qaswrah, al-Qaida in Iraq's (AQI) senior leader for northern Iraq, was killed during an October 5 operation in Mosul. Abu Qaswarah served as the operational commander of the northern AQI network, was second in command to AQI Emir Abu Ayyub al-Masri, and had historic ties to AQI founder Abu Musab al-Zarqawi and other al-Qaida senior leaders in Afghanistan and Pakistan. His death will disrupt the northern Iraq AQI network and degrade operational capability within Mosul.

Iraqi Parliamentarian Killed in Attack:

- Iraqi legislator, Saleh al-Ugaili, was killed in a roadside bomb attack in Baghdad on October 9. Al-Ugaili, a member of the Iraqi Parliament and part of Muqtada al-Sadr's political party, was the second Iraqi Parliamentarian to be killed in the past 18 months. Ambassador Ryan C. Crocker, and the commander of Multi-National Forces – Iraq, General Ray Odierno, issued a joint statement condemning Mr. Ugaili's death, calling it a "senseless act of violence" and a "heinous crime."



SECURITY – Security Transition

Patrol Base Transferred to Iraqi Army:

- Iraqi Army officials, Sayifiyah community leaders, and Multi-National Division- Center (MND-C) soldiers gathered during the ceremony commemorating the transfer of authority of Patrol Base Dezil to Iraqi control October 9. Elements from the Iraqi Army's 17th IA Division will operate from the base located in the Sayifiyah area, southeast of Baghdad along the Tigris River. Iraqi commander Lieutenant Colonel Hatim said the transfer could not have happened without the increased confidence and capabilities of Iraqi Security Forces.

Rusafa District SOI's Transferred to GOI Authority:

- A ceremony October 13 at Forward Operating Base Volunteer in the Rusafa district of east Baghdad marked the transfer of responsibility of the district's Sons of Iraq (SOI) program to the Government of Iraq. Rusafa District council chairman Al'aa Dagher cited the SOI's contribution to security improvements within the district and their importance in helping to stabilize security throughout the country. Additionally, the GOI and Iraqi Army officially took over the SOI program in Mahmudiyah October 12.

**The decrease in authorized MoD forces from the April 30 Weekly Status Report with ISF data as of March 31 reflects a change in a temporary GOI policy to increase front line units to 120% of authorized end strength to maintain present-for-duty totals at 100% while soldiers took leave. This change will make ISF reporting consistent with standard military personnel accounting practices in other countries and provide a clearer representation of ISF manning levels.

- a. Numbers do not include ministry staffs.
- b. Numbers reflect Government of Iraq (GOI) authorizations.
- c. Numbers are based upon GOI payroll data and do not reflect present for duty totals.

ECONOMIC – Economic & Government Capacity Update

Iraq Announces Plan to Improve Statistics:

- The Government of Iraq announced its first five-year statistical plan in an effort to bolster the country's collection of reliable and timely statistics, particularly those which relate to the economy, in an effort to encourage investment. According to the most recent World Bank ranking of national statistics capacity, Iraq received 51 on a scale of 100 which, given the country's oil reserves and strategic location, is not considered an acceptable score. Some economists lament the government's use of outdated statistics to calculate inflation and no census has been conducted since 1997. However, the government has begun conducting surveys of 20,000 households in an effort to gain an understanding of employment and economic activity, and a World Bank-backed household survey is expected later this year which will provide insight into poverty in the country. Around \$100 million has been set aside for the 2009 population census and Mehdi al-Alak, head of COSIT, the Central Organization for Statistics and Information Technology, expects the budget for COSIT to triple next year.

Bidding Opens for Long-Term Oil Contracts:

- Officials from the Ministry of Oil opened the bidding for the 6 oil and 2 gas fields on October 13 in London, elucidating some details about the tenders for the 34 pre-qualified international oil companies. Under the terms of the 20-year contracts, the companies would be required to form joint ventures with the majority ownership held by Iraqi state-owned company partners and supervised by a mostly-Iraqi joint board. According to Natik al-Bayati, the director-general of Iraq's Petroleum Licensing Directorate and one of Iraq's top oil negotiators, field staff would be mostly Iraqi with many Iraqis also employed in top-tier positions, despite the current lack of managers and skilled technicians in the country. Al-Bayati added that conditions in the country would not preclude companies from beginning work. "We will not have a situation where a contractor pockets the contract and then claims force majeure," he said. The sample contract drawn up by the Ministry of Oil will be made available following further negotiations with the oil companies




Etisalat to Take a Stake in Kurdish Korek Telecom:



ECONOMIC – Crude Oil Export



Note: This is a daily average for October 6 – 12



Daily Electricity Supplied and Estimated Demand in Iraq Since January 2004




- Daily electricity demand October 6 -12 was 4% above the same period last year. Daily supply from the grid was unchanged from the year-earlier period and met 60% of demand, also unchanged from the year-earlier period.
- For October 1-7 average hours of power from the grid after meeting demand from essential services were Baghdad: 15.3 and national 14.3. Year-ago levels were Baghdad 6.7 and national 11.9.

DIPLOMATIC – Political Engagement

Syria Sends Ambassador to Iraq after 29-Year Hiatus:

- Syria sent its first ambassador to Baghdad in decades, the Iraqi government reported on October 13. Iraqi Foreign Minister Hoshiyar Zebari received newly appointed Syrian Ambassador Nawaf Aboud al-Sheikh Faris, stating that he "welcomed ambassador Faris and confirmed Iraq's desire to develop and enhance bilateral relations, and to move to a new stage of cooperation."

Turkish Delegation Meets with GOI and Kurdish Leaders in Baghdad:

- A Turkish delegation, led by the country's Special Envoy for Iraq, Murat Ozcelik, met with Iraqi leaders on October 14 in Baghdad amid an increase in Turkish military strikes on suspected Kurdish rebels in northern Iraq. Ozcelik, met with Iraqi Prime Minister Nuri al-Maliki, President Jalal Talabani and President of the Kurdistan Regional Government (KRG) Massoud Barzani. Ozcelik said the meeting with Barzani went well, and he intends to visit Erbil, the capital of the KRG. According to a statement from the Prime Minister's office, Maliki insisted the two countries strengthen their cooperation in dealing with PKK rebels who operate along the Turkey-Iraq border.

DIPLOMATIC – Political Engagement



UK Stresses Importance of Agreeing on a SOFA:

- British Foreign Office Minister Bill Rammell, during a trip to Iraq on October 13, reaffirmed the UK's view that reaching a consensus on a UK-Iraq Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA) in the coming weeks is a priority. Rammell warned that if an agreement was not reached, it "would send out an unfortunate message that would undermine the genuine progress that is being made." Rammell also stated that reaching an agreement was important to show that the British forces who remain in Iraq after the U.N. mandate expires on December 31, were there with the explicit agreement of the Iraqi government.
