Darfur

- Built 34 base camps for over 7,000 African Union peacekeepers.
- Helped to broker the May 2006 Darfur Peace Agreement (DPA).
- Opened African Union DPA Implementation offices in Khartoum and El Fasher.
- Called for Commission of Inquiry and accountability for atrocities.
- Leading donors in meeting the humanitarian needs of more than 2 million people of Darfur.

- Helped to broker January 2005 Comprehensive Peace Agreement (CPA) ending 21 years of civil war.
- Supporting the Assessment and Evaluation Commission (AEC) overseeing CPA implementation.
- Transforming the SPLA into a smaller professional military organization.
- Developing basic government systems and infrastructure.
- Strengthening the SPLM and opposition political parties for elections in 2009.
