25 million lives saved through PEPFAR

5.5 million babies born HIV-free

Through the support of the PEPFAR program, 5.5 million babies were born HIV free. This amazing accomplishment was achieved through the reduction of incidence and prevalence of HIV among adolescent girls and young women, women of childbearing age, and adult men, from 2004 to 2021.

More than 20.1 million women, men, and children are on life-saving antiretroviral treatment

As of September 30, 2022, PEPFAR supported life-saving antiretroviral treatment for more than 20 million men, women, and children (compared with 18.96 million in FY21).

PEPFAR has supported countries in making HIV prevention and treatment services more accessible and equitable, achieving a 65 percent reduction in new HIV cases in males 15 to 24 years old and a 50 percent reduction in new HIV cases among females the same age since 2010.

1.5 million clients newly enrolled on PrEP to prevent HIV infection since FY21

As of September 30, 2022, 1.5 million individuals have newly enrolled on antiretroviral pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) to prevent HIV infection. Demand for PrEP continues to increase, with 1.0 million newly enrolled people on PrEP in FY21 and 312,000 in FY20.

With PEPFAR support, over a dozen high-disease burden countries have HIV under control, advancing global progress toward the UN Sustainable Development Goal target of ending the AIDS epidemic as a public health threat by 2030. Zambia is the most recent country through ZAMPHIA results, showing that 89 percent of adults aged 15 years and older living with HIV are aware of their status, 98 percent of those who are aware of their status are on treatment, and 96 percent of those on treatment are virally suppressed. ZAMPHIA 2021 also shows that 86 percent of adults living with HIV have achieved viral load suppression - a reduction of HIV in the body to undetectable levels - representing a significant improvement from the ZAMPHIA 2016 survey (59 percent among adults 15-59 years).

30 million voluntary medical male circumcisions performed to prevent HIV infections in men and boys

As of September 30, 2022, PEPFAR has helped prevent HIV infection in men and boys, including by supporting 30 million voluntary medical male circumcisions in east and Southern Africa (compared with 27.7 million last year).

2.9 million adolescent girls and young women were reached through DREAMS HIV prevention services in 2022.
